HDPD placed first in both the March Medley and Mixed Medley for Grade IV pipe bands in New Mexico's 18th annual Rio Grande Valley Celtic Festival & Highland Games held Saturday May 20th at the Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta Park. There were seven bands competing. In addition to HDPD: Order of the Thistle (Santa Fe), City of Denver (Denver) Colorado. Isle of Mull (Littleton), Seven Pipes (Tucson), Michael Collins (Denver) and Colorado Youth Pipe Band (Colorado Springs). Host bands were NM Shrine (Albuquerque) and Albuquerque Four Corner (Los Alamos).

IN THE JUDGES OPINION: critiques from Mesa, Arizona February 26, 2006

Quick March Medley (Heights of Dargai Set)

Drumming Judge: Ed Best

Points awarded: 82

Good opening rolls – nice steady and relaxed intro – very musical –bass volume too loud mostly – dominant – when you play softer it is a very nice touch – nice scores for grade – snares well set – nice snare response – bass set a little flat- nice resonance but too “ringy” on louder notes. Watch rushing of phrasing involving single strokes – together but not spot on with pipes – looking less confident – Good Show!

Ensemble Judge: Colin Berta

Points awarded: 76

Intro: great into circle --Pipes: watch “B” taps in ends of Heights of Dargai- rushed a bit. Get it on the beat – nice break into second tune – good choice of tunes – went nicely together. Tone-bass a bit ringy for my taste – good touch on bass, not too loud (except for intro rolls) – Good cutoff. Overall, nice show. Played well together, composed performance throughout.

Piping Judge: J McColl

Points awarded: 71

Attack – clean – very good tone at first – very good tone at end. Small squeal part 4 John Burgess- clean to 6/8 – comfortable all through – clean finish- Yeo!! - good performance

Mixed March Medley (Bathgate Set)

Drumming Judge: Ed Best

Points awarded: 69

Rolls – good quality – be more solid on ends. Very strong lead drum – corps drummers need to match volume and intensity – a bit timid. Right flank – needs to watch lead drum more – a bit rough in 2nd part Strathspey. Some unfortunate roughness in reel – keep practicing and get more confidence. Nice snare sound. Bass-flat to pipes – needs more muffling – too ringy. Very musical scores – fit tunes well – great potential here. Keep at it!

Ensemble Judge: Colin Berta

Points awarded: 75

Well together in intro – Jig: pipes jumping beats at ends of phrases, not locking in with sides. Strathspey – 1st downbeat not apparent in break from Slow Air from sides . Good break to reel, sides lost a bit a few bars into it – not integrating. 2nd reel- sides well behind pipes – Tone bass very “ringy” a little overwhelming. Overall: pretty good first 2/3rds of medley, last portion was unfortunate due to lack of integration between corps.

Piping Judge: J McColl

Points awarded: 74

Attack – one E a fraction late. Very nice tone – Expression – pleasing throughout. Good fingers. Clean break to jig, clean break to air, clean to Strathspey. Tempo comfortable for good playing. Good strathspey tempo. Finish – together and clean. Ability to play tunes – yes. Very nice performance all through.

Quick March Medley

Piping

Judge: Ben Holmes

Score: 64

Nice solid intro – except by one drone slip. Pitch well set! Taorluaths not together in intro tune. Go ahead-use the beat as a guide. Good use of both pulse and phrasing. Good grips & Birls. Blowing issues w/bad wavering to P/M's right. Nice tune selection. Nice control of tempo – Enjoyed.

Ensemble

Judge C Naismith

Score:70

E's not in. PM touches off bass. 1. pace a little slow. Good sound from all corps. Tight phrasing- harmony pleasing but slightly off time 2. break good. Tenors a little distracting in pt 1 – too busy. Pipers playing w/good unison, snares tight. 3. drones fading very early – keep up until finish. This was a good set, tightly played. The pace could be more spirited and lively for these tunes. Take care, mid section, to compliment melody and rhythm in tune 2 – Enjoyed it!

Drumming

Score: 64

Good intro. 1st-good here, nice rolls 2nd intro roll just a shade off – nice rolls together-well played-slight slur second time 3rd the bridging roll a shade off 4th good 5th good tenors a shade loud here 6th nice open work 7th good- 8th good, solid ending. Overall- nice sound – flowing and with some expression. Good rolls and open work – perhaps some more rudiments would enhance the sound but this was pretty solidly played.

Some unsteady blowing on that risky long note! Very nice strathspey pulse. Good phrasing. Some work to get the runs together. Not as good a job on the break from strathspey. Harmony at end muddled. Blowing not 100% at end. Very nice show. It is good to hear a band that can play a strathspey.

Score: 70

E's not blown 1.drones quite nicely blown in pt 1. pt 2-better. Piper error . Watch tenor volume, snares supportive with good unison & phrasing. 2 break good 3 break ok. All drum crescendos must commence at lower volume ie: Soft to full 4. some short notes are not short in pipe corps. Tenors loud/rattly at times. Good work in snare corps, bass 5. R side pipe errors near finish. Errors in harmonies too ---keep up concentration. A Musical set Enjoyed it!
